Dear Faculty Members,

On **August 10**, the faculty parking lot will be closed and construction work will begin.

The first few months will be dedicated to relocating infrastructure and preparing the ground for a true leap forward. Here's everything you need to know:

What's happening now?

- **Infrastructure Relocation (August–December):**
Only shallow excavations will take place. We're moving pipes and electricity lines to clear the way for deep drilling scheduled for 2026.
- **Window Sealing:**
Based on the acoustic report, partial sealing will be done on facades facing the construction site. Most sealing work will take place outside teaching hours.

Faculty Parking – "Mafligim-Namal" Lot

- Just a reminder: the **main parking lot during construction** will be the "Mafligim – Namal" lot (Waze: *נמל חיפה מפליגים*).
- Images are attached showing our designated parking area and the walking path from the lot to the faculty.

Rambam Parking – Space Available Basis

- Parking at the Rambam lot is on a **space-available basis**. It's expected to be free until 7:15 AM, though this is not guaranteed.
- Entry is possible from the main entrance (recommended) or from Efron Street.
- "Available/Full" signs will be placed near both entrances to help you decide whether to enter the lot or opt for the Namal lot instead.

Guest Parking
